Mail America to expand, create 75 jobs

Mail America Communications, Inc. announced this week it will invest more than \$5 million to expand its current operations in Forest, Virginia and add 75 net new jobs over the next three years to meet customer demands in the direct mail advertising industry.

Bedford County's Office of Economic Development worked with the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission (TICRC), the Bedford County Economic Development Authority, and The Virginia Jobs Investment Program to provide grants and assistance toward the expansion totaling more than \$210,000.

Forestry Equipment of Virginia to expand, create 35 jobs

Forestry Equipment of Virginia (FEVA)

announced recently that it will expand its custom truck assembly business constructing a 42,000 square foot weld shop facility at its 23-acre site in Forest and hiring at least 35 new employees over the next three years.

Bedford County's Office of Economic Development worked with the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission (TICRC), the Economic Development Authority and the Virginia Jobs Investment program to provide \$130,000 in grants and assistance to support the expansion.

Virginia Food System Council announces \$10/week challenge to eat local and buy local in Virginia

Did you know that if each household in the Bedford area spent at least \$10 a week on local food, more than \$16.8 million would be generated annually?

The Virginia Food System Council, along with other food and agriculture organizations, recently rolled out a challenge to all Virginia households to spend at least \$10 per week on locally-grown foods and beverages. The impact of this statewide over a year would generate \$1.65 billion back into our local economy across Virginia. In the Bedford Area that would equate to more than \$16.8 million directly within Bedford City and County. Read the full Virginia Farm to Table Plan here to learn more.
